Taller and Shorter Kids.

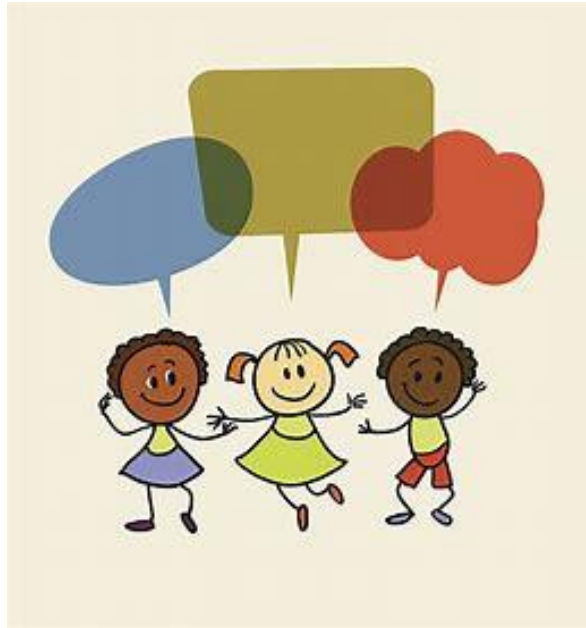
Kids with dark skin and kids with light skin.

Kids who move on their feet, and kids who use walkers, wheelchairs or wagons.

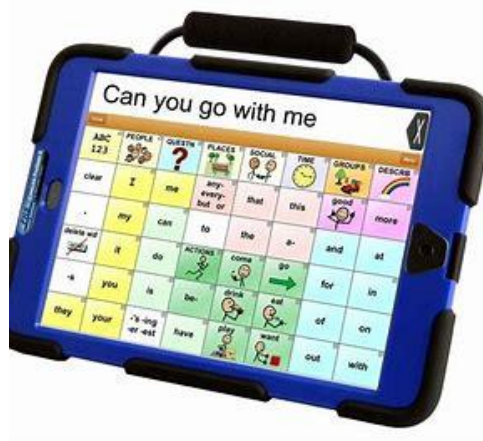


Some kids will get help from teachers to move their bodies on the playground.
